#### **OCTOBER PROGRAM**-"CATFISH CRASH COURSE" - (Part 2)

September's "Catfish Crash Course" Part I looked into the diet preferences of locally caught catfish. Joe Schmitt, VPI Doctoral Student and Sea Grant Fellow from the VPI Fisheries and Wildlife Conservation shared the results of his years of examining contents of the stomachs of catfish caught for research. Joe developed a technique, harmless to the fish, to have a catfish "blow bait" and yet be able to be returned to the wild alive.

#### **NEXT TOURNAMENT – JAMES RIVER BLUES** (By Andrew Campbell – Angling Activities Chairman) November 1st thru 31st

Virginia is blessed with outstanding catfish fishing and here in Richmond the capitol of the commonwealth we are at the epicenter of blue cat fishing!

Bob Greenlee, district fisheries biologist for VDGIF says "the James River is now a nationally recognized blue catfish fishery." Anglers from all over the country have heard of the James River and its mega catfish and catching a trophy catfish is a realistic expectation.

The tournament is limited to the James River. Fishing techniques are wide and varied ... from fly-fishing with big streamers to using cut bait and bobbers. The most popular and possibly the most effective is to use cut or whole shad or other fish on a Carolina rig. The preferred hook is a circle or modified circle hook with a wide gap fished with a medium heavy rod and a conventional reel.

Our club has many Catfish sharpies that will gladly help with the particulars if prompted~

## Page3 "Catchy Comments"

Looking at the catch database, it would appear that few members have fished or had any luck since our last meeting. Hopefully, this will change when things settle out from the recent storm, and the weather continues to cool.

Some of you may have heard me tell the story of my only Swordfishing experience but since this is a slow-fishing news month, I will tell it again. In the summer of 1977, a boat from Maryland came to Va. Beach and did some experimenting with the newly-developed technique of nighttime Swordfishing off the Virginia coast. The boat crew was successful; in fact, I think they either caught or lost fish on each of their trips. The fishing was done at night and a good ways offshore in 300-400 fathoms of water using large whole squid for bait and using balloons to keep the bait at the desired depth.

I was at home one night in September and got a call from a guy who lived in Va. Beach, whom I knew only casually, and he wanted to know if my wife and I would like to join him and his wife to go offshore and try for Swordfish on Friday night. I excitedly said yes and that we would love to go, but I knew I had a serious problem. I had only been working a couple of years and had little vacation time and had already used up all of my allotted vacation days. I knew that there was no way I could drive to Va. Beach and help get the boat ready for a 3p.m. departure without missing work on Friday. I agonized over this dilemma, but in the end I did what any young, rabidly enthusiastic, die-hard fisherman would do given this opportunity, I called in sick.

So Friday morning, my wife and I drove to Va. Beach arriving in plenty of time to help prepare the boat for a 3p.m. departure. We left Rudee Inlet in calm seas and headed for an area east of Norfolk Canyon and arrived soon after dark and began fishing. We fished three lines at 50, 100, and 200 feet depths with chemical light sticks attached to the leaders and baited with large whole squid. We would set the lines out and fish for no more than 20-30 minutes, and if we had not had a bite, we would pick up and run 3 or 4 miles and set back out.

At 11:45 p.m., I hooked a big fish that gave me an unbelievable fight. I had caught some large Blue Marlin but had never seen a fish pull this hard. It pulled like a giant tuna but was fast like a Blue Marlin. The harness cut my back, and my hands were cramped and blistered, but at just after 2 a.m., we got a gaff in the fish and got it through the transom door. We continued fishing until it began to get light, catching two other smaller Swordfish and losing two others.

We started in as the sun was rising and made it to the dock about mid-morning. The big fish weighed 363 lbs, which was a new state record, which was eclipsed long ago.

The next week, I received a call from Max Ailor (longtime Richmond Times Dispatch outdoor writer) whom I had known a long time who wanted to discuss the details of this catch. I started off telling him that I caught the fish Friday night, but he had to put in the paper that I caught it Saturday night, or I was going to be in big trouble. When the account was published in the paper, it said I caught the fish Friday night.

The boss I had at the time was a great guy and one of the best that I had during my career. He had lived most of his life in New York City and knew nothing about fishing but did thoroughly read the newspaper. After the article appeared in the paper, he came to my office and said that he thought I was sick on that Friday. I very sheepishly told him that I was sick when I got up but was feeling better about lunch time and decided to go to Va. Beach and do some Swordfishing. He left my office shaking his head and never said another word about it.

I am looking forward to the upcoming Rockfishing season. After last year's showing of fish, I expect we are in for some good fishing. I am looking for the water temperature to get to 60 degrees before starting. Hopefully, I can get to Harker's Island before then and catch a few Little Tunnys.

#### **FLY OF THE MONTH**

STONEFLY

The Stonefly was first described in a 1496 essay, "Treatyse of Fisshynge with an Angle", attributed to Dame Juliana Berners. The fly is made of a bent needle covered in wool, horse hair and drake feather.

Published in 1496 as part of the Book of St. Albans, and written by an English prioress, this little treatise explains how to make a telescoping fishing rod, fishing line, and hooks. It also explains how to fish, when, and where.

#### MANDATORY CATCH REPORTING OF TILE FISH AND COBIA COMING

Conservation and Legislation Vice-President Lynn Spurlin reports that the ASMFC (Atlantic States Marine Fisheries) has voted to make reporting of catches of Tile Fish and Cobia mandatory. When it is known when the new regulations go into effect and how the catches are to be reported, the information will be passed along to VAC Members.

#### **VDGIF MUSKIE TAG RECAPTURE PROGRAM**

## \$20 REWARD

#### For the return of tags and catch information

VA Dept. of Game and Inland Fisheries biologists have tagged Muskies in the James River. The yellow tags will be located near the fish's dorsal fin. Anglers can remove the tags by cutting through the monofilament attachment with scissors or a knife. The fish can then be released or harvested (if legal size).



Some fish have two tags. Both tags are eligible for the \$20 reward. Anglers must submit each tag with catch information to receive a reward.
